
My Careers Choices - Results in Detail

Description

The Career Choices Assessment that you completed looks at the type of things that interest you. The world of work includes many different jobs or careers that you can follow. Some of these are concerned with working with people, others with more technical or practical jobs. Some jobs are more focussed on working with words, information and data. Everyone has a set of things that interest them most. The above graph shows how interested you are in each of the three main areas of work. Your results are displayed in rank order of priority from your highest to lowest scores.

You are mainly interested in jobs and training that deal with technical, science, arts and practical things. As you will see below, many different types of jobs are included in each area and you now need to look at exactly what type of work areas most suits your interests. Don't forget that interest in a subject is one thing, being able to do it is another. There are many factors including interests that help you to become successful. These include what you are good at, what motivates you, how you like to learn and, of course, more practical things such as whether you can afford to train and if you need to find work.


Technical, Science, Arts and Practical

Group Worker




Description

Looking & Listening




Description


Your Result

Understanding your test scores

Comparison group - Your comparison group when exploring your results is Level 1.

Your result on each ability test will be described as being in one of the following categories. You should think of each result as follows:

Group	Description	Range of Score
High	your score is a great deal better than others in your comparison group	Тор 10%
Above average	your score is generally better than the majority of people in your comparison group	Next 20%
Average	your score is very similar to others in your comparison group	Middle 40%
Fair	your score is not quite as good as others in your comparison group	Next 20%
Low	your score is lower than most people in your comparison group	Lower 10%

It is also true to say that the score you gain on this test may not be absolutely precise since it is recognized that you may do slightly better or worse if you sat the test again. The range in which your true score is expected to fall is represented by the length of the black line underneath the diamond.

Although it is quite useful to know how you did when compared with other people, it is much more important to compare your own scores against each other. This will help you to focus on your own strengths and interests and also to find out what aspects you find difficult.
